'New Cold War' will hurt researchers everywhere

On October 20, 2020, Science | Business published How a 'new Cold War' between China and US will hurt researchers everywhere. Researchers predict the US government crackdown on Chinese involvement in US science will be maintained, and the current political tension between the two nations will persist, no matter who wins next month's US presidential election.

Included in the report: This suspicion of Chinese and Chinese-American scientists is having a big impact on individuals, says Gisela Kusakawa of the Asian Americans Advancing Justice group, which offers legal support. "It's a pattern of heightened scrutiny on one group. Often times we'll see cases involving researchers of Chinese descent, where their lives have been left in shambles by investigations," Kusakawa said. "Because of over-zealous prosecutions, based on racial bias, lives have been upended." Many of the charges against Chinese researchers do not come up to the level of economic espionage or IP theft, Kusakawa says. "A lot are for minor issues, which would normally be handled internally in universities," she said.

There has been "disprortionate targeting" of Chinese in the US, and it has grown worse since the COVID-19 outbreak, said Yangyang Cheng, a physicist at Cornell University in New York. "The hostile environment is not just because of the 'Chinese initiative'," Cheng said. "American society has become more explicitly racist towards Chinese people."

A Culture of Silence? Reports from SupChina and Aljazeera

The loudest voices on WeChat in the U.S. have long been those of conservative, first-generation immigrants from mainland China who support Trump. This is now a reality for some Asian Americans bearing the brunt of increasing tensions between the United States and China. The COVID-19 pandemic and US presidential race are creating the perfect storm, as experts warn the two countries could be heading towards a new Cold War. As President Donald Trump blames China for the virus, two-thirds of surveyed Americans say they do not trust the country and Americans of Asian descent are increasingly being violently attacked. 101 East investigates what the battle of the superpowers means for Asian Americans.

ASA Task Force on the 2020 Census

On October 23, 2020, Science Magazine published <u>Census needs review, panel says</u>. According to the report, the American Statistical Association has assembled a task force to report publicly on whether the Census Bureau has met its goal of "counting everyone once, and only once, and in the right place." The task force was prompted by what it regards as unprecedented political interference by President Donald Trump's administration into the \$15 billion decennial head count conducted by the nation's largest statistical agency. The twist is the latest in the troubled 2020 census, which went live on 1 April after 10 years of planning. Task force members say an independent assessment is needed "to restore public confidence in the 2020 census."

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
